




#### Warm Weather Arrangements

Whilst we are in the 'British Summer' period, please also remember to provide your child with sunscreen should they be outside.








Newsome Academy Gained National Status and was awarded the 'Centre of Excellence Award'. This recognises the work we do in educating our students on oracy and our range of successful literacy initiatives.

Voice 21 Oracy Centres of Excellence are leading the way in providing a high-quality oracy education for their students, acting as beacons of good practice for oracy across the school system. They build on their strong foundations of outcomes, expertise and drive to work collaboratively, to reciprocally share expertise and good practice with more colleagues and schools across the country and beyond, in order to benefit a greater number of students and communities.



Newsome Academy Gained National Status and was awarded the 'National SEND Award' for 'Most Innovative Intervention'. This recognises the great work that we do for learners with additional needs – of any kind.

In April 2013 ex-local authority specialist teacher, Richard Daniel Curtis, founded a special needs consultancy service called The Root Of It. In providing therapists, counsellors, psychologists and professionals for educational settings across England. He noticed that many awards existed for individual teachers, but there were none to celebrate good SEN practice. Richard set about founding awards to do just that. In 2015 he established a judging panel from important organisations in the sector and set about establishing the award categories. For the first year the team emailed every school they knew to get them to enter – 18 entries were received. The SEN Awards continued the following year with entries open to primary and secondary schools in England. By 2017, that had expanded to primary, secondary and FE settings across the four regions of the UK, reaching over 20,000 schools. In 2018, this was expanded to cover inclusion in employment up to 25 years (in line with national SEND code of practice). The awards were retitled to the National Special Educational Needs and Disability Awards and regional conferences were added to share the inspirational stories with more than a thousand settings across the country.



#### Seven secrets of how to have a great summer




**It's over!**: Around 650,000 British teenagers have taken GSCEs this year and will get their results on 22 August.



**Learn a language.** <u>Ludwig Wittgenstein</u> wrote that "the limits of my language are the limits of my world". Languages break up the world differently: for example, Russian has distinct words for "dark blue" and "light blue". Things that we think are the same can appear different in another language and vice versa. So it is well worth plugging away at your French or German this summer, or doing something different and picking up Chinese, Arabic or Urdu.

Make new friends. French thinker Jacques Derrida wrote that having friends is what allows us to understand ourselves and come to terms with our mortality, since they remind us that everything comes with a time limit. Making a new friend this summer could bring out an aspect of yourself you never knew was there.

**Read, read.** Ancient Chinese philosopher <u>Confucius</u> argued we improve ourselves through education. He thought that it teaches us how to act morally, which in turn fills us with the disposition that we need to live a moral life, which he called "ren", roughly translating as "humanity".<sup>4</sup> If you spend the summer reading books, you may start the next academic year a better person.



Is happiness harder than fun? The summer holiday is in view at last and most of us are looking forward to months of mindless fun. But is that the truest path to human contentment?


Hang up the uniform. Put away the pens and notepads. For thousands up and down the country, exams are over, the school year is done and eleven glorious weeks of holiday beckon.

Some unlucky souls have to plough on for another week. But most GCSE and A Level students are free, just as the long-awaited summer weather finally arrives.

But many will be unsure how to celebrate their newfound liberty. Others may feel too burnt out to make the most of it.

Some of us will be tempted to spend it doing whatever seems fun. But psychologists say mere fun can be fleeting and unsatisfying. Being happy is a different task.


So here are seven tips from great thinkers to help you not just have fun this summer, but find happiness too.



**Get new hobbies.** <u>Karl Marx</u> thought human beings need activity. He believed that making things with our hands and brains is a form of <u>self-actualisation</u> that makes us more fully human.<sup>5</sup> So try taking up sewing or clay modelling.

**Get politically involved.** <u>Aristotle</u> wrote that "humanity is a political animal".<sup>6</sup> He thought it was only by engaging in political life that we reach our full potential. And with the election coming up, now is the perfect time to join in.

**Do nothing.** Chinese philosopher **Zhuang Zi** believed in the art of "wu wei", meaning "doing nothing". But this did not mean being idle: it meant not acting against the universe. We should give up our own **ego**-driven plans and try to live in perfect accord with nature. So this summer, just do whatever the world seems to be telling you to do.



#### Fun in the sun


**Yes:** Having a lark is the easiest thing in the world, but it passes quickly. Building a deep bedrock of happiness takes time and the cultivation of self-knowledge.

**No:** Happiness is nothing but the accumulation of fun. Try to have fun in everything that you do, and you will quickly find that happiness comes naturally. It is finding the fun in difficult and boring things that is hard.

**Or...** Happiness does mean more than just having fun, but we cannot be happy without having fun. The important thing is to find out what we truly enjoy doing, and do as much of it as we can.
