


- A text and email are sent to families note that this is dependent on whether you are keeping your details updated.


Please make sure that we have your most current address and contact numbers. It is the responsibility of parents/carers to have this live at all times.

Who has inflicted this upon us? Who has made us Jews different from all other people? Who has allowed us to suffer so terribly up till now? It is God that has made us as we are. but it will be God, too, who will raise us up again. If we hear all this suffering and if there are still Jews left, when it is over, then Jews, instead of being doomed, will be held up as an example. Anne Frank



From 1933 to 1945, six million of my people were killed. Many were shot. Many were starved. Many were burned in ovens or gassed in chambers. I was not. I was born sometime in 1944. I do not know my birthdate. I do not know my birth name. I do not know what city or country I was born. I do not know if I had brothers or sisters. What I do know is that when I was a few months old, I was saved. I often imagine what my family's life was like the last few weeks we spent together. I imagine my mother and father robbed of everything they owned, forced from their home and sent to a Ghetto (poor living quarters).

Later, perhaps we were ordered to leave the ghetto. My parents must have been eager to leave the barbed wire fenced section of the city to escape the typhus, overcrowding, filth and starvation. But did they know where they would go next? Were they told that they were being resettled in a better place? A place where there would be food and work? Had they heard whispered rumours of Death Camps? I wonder how they felt when they were herded to the railway station with hundreds of other Jews, crammed into a cattle car, standing only. Did they panic when they heard the doors barred shut?

The train must have travelled from one village to another through pastoral landscapes strangely untouched by terror. How many days were we on that train? How many hours did my parents stand crushed together?

I imagine my mother holding me close to protect me from the stench, the cries, the fears inside that packed car. By now she probably knew she was not heading to a place of safety. I wonder where she stood. Was she in the middle of the car? Was my father next to her? Did he tell her to be brave? Did they talk about what to do? When did they make their decision? Did she work her way to the wooden wall of the car? While she wrapped my tightly in a warn blanket, did she whisper my name? Did she cover my face with kisses and tell me that she loved me? Did she cry? Did she pray?

As the train slowed through a village, my mother must have looked up through the opening near the top of the cattle car. With my father, she must have tried spreading the barbed wire that covered the hole. My mother must have lifted me over her head towards the dim daylight. What happened next is the only thing I know for sure. My mother threw me from the train.

Lessons we can learn – Humanity

- We are one human race We must see beyond labels, beyond accents, gender or skin colours, and see all people as one. Recognise the things on common rather than the differences between us.
- The Holocaust was not carried out by evil monsters, but by people - Bystanders, perpetrators, upstanders and collaborators were human like any one of us. The Holocaust was a result of choices they made.
- Victims were human each with their own story not numbers and statistics

Lessons we can learn – Society

- Hatred is learnt We are not born hating. Racist ideology influences the masses by harnessing the persuasive power of propaganda.
- Being Jewish is a religion and culture not a race. Antisemitism is a form of prejudice against Jewish people based on hatred and ignorance.
- **Upholding democracy and human rights** is important to sustain equality, peace, dignity, freedom and justice.
- Racism and prejudice is real and exists in the UK but we each have a choice in how we respond to it

Lessons we can learn – Individuals

- **Be an upstander, not be a bystander**. Be the change. Individuals can/do make a difference.
- Make an informed choice when confronted with prejudice or hate
- Actively remember the Holocaust as it demonstrates the fragility of all societies, rights, freedom
- Safeguarding historical/primary records is important to learning from the past to make a better future.
