



Dear Families,


The time has come for our Year 11 students to leave Newsome Academy. They will leave after their final Science exam on **Monday 16th June**.


Exam Etiquette



What does the word 'etiquette' mean and where does it come from?







What does the word 'etiquette' mean and where does it come from?

Etiquette refers to the set of social conventions and rules that govern behavior in polite society. It dictates how people should act in various situations, from formal gatherings to everyday interactions. The term originates from the French word "étiquette," which initially meant "label" or "ticket". This evolved to encompass the rules and instructions written on these "tickets" or labels, which were used to guide behavior, particularly in formal settings like the French royal court.

Etymology (study & origin of words):


- The word "etiquette" comes from the French word "étiquette," which itself is derived from the Old French word "estiquette".
- "Estiquette" meant "label" or "ticket".
- The connection between "label" and "etiquette" in its current meaning is thought to stem from the practice of using small cards or tickets to convey instructions for proper behavior, especially at the French royal court. These cards might have specified where to stand, what to do, or how to act in various situations.
- The use of these "etiquettes" gradually expanded to encompass the broader concept of proper social behavior and conduct.
- Ultimately, "etiquette" evolved to denote the generally accepted rules and customs for polite behavior in social or professional settings.




So, what do you think 'exam etiquette' involves?

- 1. Prepare for your exams in advance.
- 2. Check and understand your exam timetable.
- 3. Make sure all **electronic devices** are taken **off** / switched off and left in your bag e.g. mobile phones, headphones, smart watches etc. You will be instructed by your teacher/invigilator to leave your bags in a safe place.
- 4. If you need to take in any equipment, this should be exam approved (e.g. like a non-programmable Casio calculator and word for word dictionary) and in a clear pencil case, **but you should only need a black pen**.
- 5. Bottles of water without the label may be permitted.
- 6. LISTEN and do not talk on entrance into the exam, during the exam and when leaving the exam!
- 7. Seat number listen to the teacher/invigilator for your aisle letter and seat number and ask if you are not sure. If you are completing exams in lessons, then you will usually sit in your normal seat but always follow your teacher's instructions.
- 8. Once settled, listen to the teacher/invigilator for further instructions.
- 9. Check you have the **correct paper** given to you (subject, unit, tier) and alert an invigilator if it is incorrect.
- **10. Read** the instructions on the front of your paper and when instructed fill in the necessary details neatly and using capital letters.
- 11. The exam invigilator / teacher will mark your **attendance** when you are sat in your seat.
- **12. Use ALL the time given to you, including extra-time!** Check over your answers and make sure you attempt all the questions needed!



13. **DO NOT** put your head down on the desk if you have finished; remain upright and facing forwards sitting quietly – any communication with others is taken seriously and can mean failing your exam.

14. STOP working when instructed and close your answer booklet.

15. **Wait** until your paper has been collected and until you are asked to leave the room. When instructed, do so in **SILENCE!**

16. Go and get your belongings and wait for further instructions.


17. If you have any **questions** during the exam, simply put your hand up and an invigilator will come over to you – just remember they cannot answer any questions from the paper.

18. **Fire Alarm** – should the fire alarm sound – remain calm and wait for further instructions from the invigilators.

Years 9 and 10 will be completing exams in the Sports Hall and Years 7 and 8 in classrooms.

Please listen to staff and follow their instructions.
