Introducing the Gatsby Benchmarks





What are the Gatsby Benchmarks?



The eight benchmarks define world-class careers guidance for young people in England, based on international evidence. They are now used in over 4,700 secondary schools, colleges and independent training providers.

The Gatsby Benchmarks have been central to government **statutory guidance for secondary schools**_and guidance for colleges since 2018. Since then, national performance against the eight benchmarks has more than tripled.

In 2024, following two years of extensive research and consultation, the Gatsby Benchmarks were updated to ensure they continue to define world-class career guidance for young people.



WHY THE GATSBY BENCHMARKS ARE IMPORTANT



The Gatsby Benchmarks have a key role in:

- raising young people's aspirations and promoting access to all career pathways
- enabling all young people to develop the skills and outlook they need to achieve career wellbeing, including adaptability and resilience
- underpinning the Department for Education guidance to schools on meeting their statutory responsibility for careers guidance.
 - In a nutshell they help young people develop skills and knowledge for the future



Gatsby Benchmarks in

1. A stable careers programme

Every school and college should have an embedded programme of career education and guidance that is known and understood by

students, parents, staff, governors and employers.

2. Learning from career and labour market information

Every student and their parents should have access to good quality information about future study options and labour market

opportunities. They will need the support of an informed adviser to make best use of available information.

3. Addressing the needs of each student

Students have different career guidance needs at different stages. Opportunities for advice and support need to be tailored to the needs of each student. A school's careers programme should embed equality and diversity considerations throughout.

4 Linking curriculum learning with careers

All teachers should link curriculum learning with careers. For example, STEM subject teachers should highlight the relevance of STEM subjects to a wide range of career pathways.

5 Encounters with employers and employees

Every student should have multiple opportunities to learn from employers about work, employment and the skills that are valued in

the workplace. This can be through a range of enrichment activities including visiting speakers, mentoring and enterprise schemes.

6. Experiences of workplaces

Every student should have first-hand experiences of the workplace through work visits, work shadowing and/or work experience to

help their exploration of career opportunities and expand their networks.

7. Encounters with further and higher education

All students should understand the full range of learning opportunities that are available to them. This includes both academic and

technical and vocational routes, and learning in schools, colleges, universities and in the workplace.

8. Personal Guidance

Every student should have opportunities for guidance interviews with a careers adviser, who could be internal (a member of school

staff) or external, provided they are trained to an appropriate level. These should be available whenever significant study or career

choices are being made. They should be available for all students but should be timed to meet their individual needs.



What do we do at Newsome Academy?



- Independent and impartial careers guidance
- Careers appointments with the Careers Advisor, on request or via lunchtime drop-in sessions (at least one 1-1 appointment by age 16)
- Individual My Directions accounts which provide students with the information they need to make decisions about the future. They will access careers information tailored to their age and relevant to all the different stages of career planning
- Personal record of their career journey (interactions, skills builder, research etc.)
- Regular updates on local careers events, the regional labour market information and work experience and apprenticeship opportunities
- Opportunities to engage with a wide range of professionals from a variety of careers, industries, and FE, HE and apprenticeship providers to support students making informed choices
- At least one meaningful encounter with an employee or employer each academic year
- At least one experience of a workplace by the age of 16
- Support that is bespoke to address every student's individual needs to minimise the barriers to future opportunities, ensuring inclusion is at the heart

Gatsby Benchmark 8 Personal Guidance



• Every student should have opportunities for guidance interviews with a Careers Adviser, who could be internal or external, provided they are trained to an appropriate level.

• These should be available whenever significant study or career choices are being made. They should be expected for all students but should be timed to meet their individual needs.

• Every student should have at least one such interview by the age of 16.


